During this week, lots of fun, play-based activities and events take place on themes such as positional language, shape, space and size. The next week of activities is from the 14th-18th May. Workshops for parents on how to support their child's early numeracy development at home will take place from 30th April-4th May. At the end of June, there will also be storytelling sessions in the local ECCE centres on the book 'The Big Red Bath'.

Play Opportunities on the way to the Playground

Children learn a lot through play and it is important to allow them to explore the world around them. Deborah Clarke, Play Development Officer with Dublin City Council says that play can take place anywhere and at any time and not just in playgrounds or through traditional play. She has given us some ideas on play opportunities or things you can talk to your child about on the way to the playground:

- Walk along the path and count the number of steps between each line. Suggest taking giant steps and then baby steps and compare how many steps it takes using these different methods of walking.
- Recognise landmarks and guess when they are going to appear
- Spot numbers and letters on doors
- Spot colours of doors
- Admire and identify the various flowers, trees etc. along the way
- Spot wildlife along the way (birds, cats, dogs, bugs, bees etc.)
- Look at how high different houses and buildings are
- Measure child's height alongside railings, walls, gates etc.
- Billboards, adverts etc. identify numbers, letters and colours in a playful way
- Watch for the traffic light colours and time sequence
- Encourage interaction with other children and adults during the journey to enhance social skills, conversation, vocabulary etc.
